BELLA ROSA, THE ITALIAN RESTAURANT AT PADMA RESORT BALI

Bella Rosa, a fine dining establishment specializing in Italian cuisine, is located just meters away from the spectacular Legian's legendary sunset beachfront. In addition to indoor and outdoor seating capacity, it also offers unparalleled views of the Indian Ocean and nice sea breezes for al-fresco diners.

Following a contemporary design that is both simplistic and elegant in concept, Bella Rosa's décor combines a visually stimulating blend of natural wood and stone elements. Like the rest of the property, there is an obvious move away from traditional Balinese architectural principals that have resulted in an exciting and fresh look. The air-conditioned dining interior presents an illusion of its merge into the two outdoor terraced areas, making the entire restaurant appear a lot more spacious than its 115-seat capacity. Full-length glass windows that allow a play on light have created a seamless dining effect. This is especially dramatic in the evening when candles flicker seductively from each table setting.



Bella Rosa's warm and unpretentious ambience is guaranteed to put guests at ease, whether they just drop in for a casual bite at lunchtime or visit it for a more intimate dining occasion. Alternatively, it also makes for a pleasant spot to enjoy a cup of specialty coffee or a slice of cake or even to chat leisurely with friends. The restaurant is easily accessed via a service road that runs along Legian beachfront where patrons are free to wander in throughout the course of the day and evening. Weather permitting, its elevated terrace is the perfect setting to experience Bali's famous sunset splayed over the horizon.

Chef John Taylor has prepared a comprehensive menu for Bella Rosa focusing on popular Italian pasta dishes, wood-fired pizzas and delicious choices of house favourites. Additionally, all sauces are prepared daily from traditional recipes using ripe tomatoes, herbs and spices. Meals are generous in size and therefore filling, so diners are advised to leave just a little room to indulge in a treat of delectable homemade deserts.



Notable dishes featured on the menu include a zesty pesto dip that accompanies the complimentary breadbasket, a hearty Minestrone Soup and the tasty Salmon Carpaccio with Rocket Salad. The pasta section is highlighted by a choice of spaghetti, tortellini and lasagne. However, diners can choose to have their particular sauce served atop black pepper linguine, squid tagliatelli, maccheroni or 3-coloured fusilli. For something more substantial, other popular main dishes include Grilled Lamb Skewer with roasted garlic sauce or the seafood preferences of Crab Crusted Baramundi Osso Buco and the sensational Sautéed Prawns.

Bella Rosa also makes what some consider Bali's best wood-fired pizzas cooked in a traditional smoke house oven. The oven is distanced from the restaurant and conveniently overlooks the swimming pool, allowing sunbathers and swimmers to enjoy poolside pizza snacks. There is a choice of 11 different toppings served piping hot, Italian style, on a thin crust base. The menu includes your standard Pizzas' Marinara, Margherita and Hawaii, but perhaps special mention should be made of the unusually named Pizza of the Gods – topped with goat's cheese, sun dried tomato, fresh mozzarella cheese, olives, roasted garlic, pepperoni salami and pesto.

The Italian dining room also serves tempting assortment of sumptuous desserts. A slice of Strawberry Cheese Cake Trifle and specialty coffee is the ideal combination to conclude any meal. Complementing the entire menu is an extensive beverage list featuring spirits, liqueurs, beers, non-alcoholic cocktails and a selection of international class wines.

PROFILE

EXECUTIVE CHEF JOHN TAYLOR OF PADMA RESORT BALI BELIEVES IN THE FLAVOUR OF HOME-STYLE COOKING

Scottish born John Taylor has been associated with the food and beverage industry since the tender age of nine, when he had the privilege of working in the kitchen of his aunt's family hotel in Scotland. Since then, he has steadily built on his skills, through formal education and sheer experience in Europe and Asia to bring a unique flavour and flair to the cuisine at Padma Resort Bali.

He is hardly a typical executive chef that you would normally find on the island of Bali. The seasoned cook is predominantly self-taught, starting with his tenure at the Prince of Hessen's Resort Hessischer Hof, Frankfurt, which began back in 1977. "I learned a lot at the Hessischer Hof which had one of the best dining restaurants in Germany", says John, "while the rest of the world was becoming more computerized, we stuck by our old-style recipes, giving our customer elegant meals with a home cooked appeal."

In 1985, after eight years in Germany, John moved to Asia as the sous chef of the Jianguo Hotel Beijing. The challenge there was maintaining a fine dining restaurant with over 250 covers with the limited raw materials available in the market. In China, John learned the art of mixing Asian flavors and developed a taste and respect for subtle spices. From the Jianguo Resort, he moved to Swire Air Caterer's in Hong Kong under the guidance of the Peninsula Resort, learning to prepare different cuisines including Indian, halal and Japanese dishes. After two years with Swire group, he joined Padma Resort Bali in 1990.

"I entered right at the development stage, before the opening of Resort Padma, when we were still carving out a food and beverage program for the Resort. We were able to decide on outlets and menus." Bringing all his previous experience, John perfected country-style food with Asian flavours. Spices are the key. There is so much to choose from in Bali, and they can be mixed and matched with such ease. Today, John runs a tight shift with over 70 staff members at 4 restaurants reporting to him. With his over-15-year of familiarity of Bali, he could be considered as one of the most well known creative chefs in the island.

A keen golfer, fisherman and cricket, John finds himself both busy and relaxed in Bali. Thanks to his job, he also enjoys close friendships with the Resort's repeat customers .

THE GENERAL MANAGER, TJIPJANTO SOERJANTO

Indonesian born Tjipjanto Soerjanto, the General Manager of Padma Resort Bali, embarked on his career in the hospitality industry as Sales Executive for Jakarta Hilton International in 1987. Upon joining Padma Resort Bali in 1989, he was appointed as Sales and Marketing Manager in the Resort's pre-opening team and later was promoted to Director of Sales and Marketing position. BALI

Location and access

Dubbed the Island of the Gods, the volcanic island of Bali is located almost at the center of the Indonesian archipelago and about eight degrees south of the equator. In addition to Garuda Indonesia, many major airlines fly to Bali on a regular basis, making it easily accessible from most parts of the world. The island is on the same time zone as Singapore, Kuala Lumpur and Hong Kong (GMT +8).

Climate and clothing

Bali's equatorial climate is usually mild. It has a short hot and humid season (November to March) and a longer, cooler dry season (April to October) when the trade winds blow. Temperatures are usually between 28 to 31 degree Celcius during the day but they may drop to the low teens in the mountain regions at night. Humidity is at its highest during the rainy season but the sun is rarely out of sight for long. Comfortable casual cotton clothing is recommended. Ties and suits are seldom worn in Bali. As ultra violet rays can be quite high, headgear and sunglasses are also advisable.

Agriculture and food

Although these days more and more Balinese work in the ever-expanding tourism industry, Bali still retains much of its agricultural areas and beautiful rice terraces. Rice cultivation remains an important social force and much of the traditional culture and religion can find their roots in rice cultivation. The system of *subak* (irrigation cooperative) is highly visible when one walks along most rice paddies; it is one of the most extensive water distribution systems in Asia. Bali's cool highlands are also the growing areas for many export crops such as vegetables and coffee.

Whether home grown or imported, food in Bali is plentiful and many restaurants cater to an ever-growing palette of diverse tastes, from Indonesian, Greek, Japanese, Lebanese, Indian, Californian, to popular east-west fusion cuisine. Nowadays some of the restaurants in Bali rival the best in major metropolis.

Culture, social life and arts

Religion and agriculture are the basis of the social system in Bali. As the Balinese calendar has 210 days and is largely based on the phases of the moon, ceremonies (*upacara*) and processions are an everyday occurrence in many villages and temples.

Visitors are usually welcome to witness and enjoy the celebrations if they are properly and conservatively attired.

With plentiful agriculture providing much of the necessary basic resources, Balinese have developed very rich forms of art, inspired both by the island and other parts of the world. Many famous foreign artists have lived in Bali and there is a vibrant artist community working and living in Ubud area.

Language

Balinese language is a complex one related to Javanese. In addition, all Balinese speak Indonesian (the national language of Indonesia) and most people in the tourism industry speak English, Japanese or other languages.

Religion

Bali's unique variant of Hinduism permeates every aspect of the island's culture and life. Bali has retained many elements of the fusion between indigenous and Hindu cultures that took place several centuries ago throughout the Indonesian archipelago. From there, the island has evolved its own "Hindu" religion, incorporating many aspects of Buddhism and animism.

While Balinese Hinduism is the main religion in the island, other religions are given the freedom to practice and one can find many churches, temples and mosques there.

PRACTICAL TIPS**Airport**

Bali is accessible by air through Ngurah Rai International Airport, Denpasar, Bali. Most international flights connect through Soekarno-Hatta Airport, Jakarta, or Changi Airport, Singapore. Departure Tax: Rp 150,000 (international), Rp 30,000 (domestic).

Immigration

Visitors to Indonesia must possess passports valid for at least six months from date of entry and immigration officials usually request visitors to show their return tickets. Visa on arrival is applicable for certain nationalities. It is advisable for visitors to check with the Indonesian embassy or consulate in their respective countries for visa requirements.

Customs

Indonesian customs in Bali are fairly relaxed. However, trafficking of illegal drugs is a major offence in Indonesia and is punishable by death.

Electricity

220 volts/50 cycles

Currency and exchange

The Indonesian currency is Rupiah. Resorts, banks and moneychangers normally provide exchange services for major currencies, but these services do not always apply to traveler's checks.

Credit cards

Major restaurants, shops, Resorts and department stores accept credit cards. However, they are unlikely to be accepted in small towns and villages.

Tipping

Most international Resorts and restaurants add a service charge to the bill, but a modest tip is always appreciated for good service. Smaller places do not add any service charge and any tip left is therefore at the guest's discretion, depending on the service rendered.

Health and accidents

There are several medical centres in Bali and most quality Resorts have doctors on call. There is however, no world class hospital for major medical emergencies. Hence, ensuring evacuation insurance coverage for any major trauma is recommended. Dental care is available from a range of practitioners. Although it is advisable to consume only sealed bottled water and properly cooked meals, food and beverages in Bali are usually considered reasonably safe. Bear in mind that drinking too many ice-cold drinks and fruit juices or eating too much spicy food may lead to abdominal cramps and diarrhoea (Bali belly).
